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
AAW OF WOODTURNERS

Minutes of the MMAW Meeting, March 13, 2021

9:30 Social Period

10:05 The business part of the meeting opened.

President Guy Schafer reported that the Paramount Art Center is discussing when to allow meetings at the Tech Center. He also reported that Gary Mrozek is preparing a new demo video on natural edge turning with a special section on microwave drying. He has developed a method of microwave drying that allows him to dry a blank one day after cutting down the tree. Tom Lillehei cautioned that the microwave needs to be at a very low setting. The target temperature is in the range of 120° to 140°. Gary's videos are now on YouTube.

Craft Supplies gift coupons were awarded to Gary Mrozek and Ellen Starr. Both received coupons for pictures of their recent work. Ellen has sent a picture of her tiny hollow lidded vessel and finial. Ellen used a tool she made from an allen wrench.

The Executive Board is discussing the purchase of AAW insurance to cover liability.

Guy urges members to suggest online demos that would be appropriate for our meetings during the time of Covid related restrictions.

Kirk DeHeer gave an online demo of turning wooden eggs, a project he highly recommends because it involves a lot of repetition of several techniques. Kirk described the tools and techniques used in each step of the project. Once Kirk has the egg shaped, he sands it with the tenon still intact. He then mounts a new blank from which he makes a jam chuck to use in finishing the ends of the egg.

TOOLS EXPLAINED

DRILL PRESS: A tall upright machine useful for suddenly snatching flat metal bar stock out of your hands so that it smacks you in the chest and flings your beer across the room, denting the freshly-painted project which you had carefully set in the corner where nothing could get to it.

WIRE WHEEL: Cleans paint off bolts and then throws them somewhere under the workbench with the speed of light. Also removes fingerprints and hard-earned calluses from fingers in about the time it takes you to say, 'Oh sh*t'

DROP SAW: A portable cutting tool used to make studs too short.

PLIERS: Used to round off bolt heads. Sometimes used in the creation of blood-blisters.

VISE-GRIPS: Generally used after pliers to completely round off bolt heads. If nothing else is available, they can also be used to transfer intense welding heat to the palm of your hand.

ADJUSTABLE WRENCH: aka "Another hammer", aka "the Swedish Nut Lathe", aka "Crescent Wrench". Commonly used as a one size fits all wrench, usually results in rounding off nut heads before the use of pliers. Will randomly adjust size between bolts, resulting in busted buckles, curse words, and multiple threats to any inanimate objects within the immediate vicinity.

BELT SANDER: An electric sanding tool commonly used to convert minor touch-up jobs into major refinishing jobs.

HACKSAW: One of a family of cutting tools built on the Ouija board principle... It transforms human energy into a crooked, unpredictable motion, and the more you attempt to influence its course, the more dismal your future becomes.

TABLE SAW: A large stationary power tool commonly used to launch wood projectiles for testing wall integrity.

BAND SAW: A large stationary power saw primarily used by most shops to cut good aluminum sheet into smaller pieces that more easily fit into the trash can after you cut on the inside of the line instead of the outside edge.

PHILLIPS SCREWDRIVER: Normally used to stab the vacuum seals under lids or for opening old-style paper-and-tin oil cans and splashing oil on your shirt; but can also be used, as the name implies, to strip out Phillips screw heads.

STRAIGHT SCREWDRIVER: A tool for opening paint cans. Sometimes used to convert common slotted screws into non-removable screws and butchering your palms.

HOSE CUTTER: A tool used to make hoses too short.

HAMMER: Originally employed as a weapon of war, the hammer nowadays is used as a kind of divining rod to locate the most expensive parts adjacent the object we are trying to hit.


UTILITY KNIFE: Used to open and slice through the contents of cardboard cartons delivered to your front door; works particularly well on contents such as seats, vinyl records, liquids in plastic bottles, collector magazines, refund checks, and rubber or plastic parts. Especially useful for slicing work clothes, but only while in use.

Son of a bitch TOOL: Any handy tool that you grab and throw across the garage while yelling 'Son of a b*tch' at the top of your lungs. It is also, most often, the next tool that you will need.
