Here are some simple, but easily forgotten, woodturning tips!

Gear Up. Anytime you are near the lathe, whether it is on or off, it's a great habit to be wearing safety gear. The essential woodturning safety equipment includes **safety glasses**, **full face shield**, **respirator and an efficient air filtration system**.

What must you never do while working on a lathe? Tie back long hair or beards, do not wear gloves, avoid loose clothing, jewelry and any dangling objects that may catch on rotating parts or accessories. Becoming entangled in the rotating equipment can lead to serious injury or death. Like all machines you must give the lathe your undivided attention during use. Never wear gloves when operating machinery with accessible rotating or other moving parts. This includes, but is not limited to, most woodworking and machining equipment such as drill presses, <u>lathes</u>, sanders, jointers, milling machines, and grinders.

What is ABC of wood turning? There is a woodturning term called the "ABCs" of woodturning. It's a nice little phrase to remember what to do when you approach your turning wood at the lathe. Anchor the tool, Rub the Bevel, then Cut.

What is the golden ratio in woodturning? You have probably heard the term "Golden Ratio" used when designing or creating a piece. There is a technical formula for determining this ratio. Many older turners, who simplify the math, consider it to be a 1/3 to 2/3 ratio.

DEMO:

Linda Ferber came up from the Twin Cities to do a demo on one of her specialties "fanciful tops." Linda reviewed her preferences for dust control, tools and wood. She values designs which feature whimsical elements, even at the expense of making the tops somewhat wobbly. She prefers to use her heavy gouge simply because she feels that she can take advantage of her familiarity with the tool and her "muscle memory". Lin-

da uses a story board type drawing to establish proportions and dimensions. Once she has turned a cylinder, she lays out the sections of the top with her parting tool before she actually begins the shaping with her gouge. To assure a regular diameter for the stem, Linda measures using ordinary wrenches.

Linda adds colorful design interest to her tops by using artists paint. She protects the lathe bed from splatters with magnetic vent covers. Linda is a great believer in sample boards to show the hues of the various paints she uses as well as the cuts produced by the burrs available for rotary tools for wood carving. Each burr produces a distinctive cut allowing for a broad range of decorative effects. With her sample boards of colors and cuts she can choose the exact option to achieve her design goals.
