

Instant Gallery:

Fred Schmoll had a small bowl and cup turned from some mystery wood he had.

Guy Schafer made a rectangular lidded box from a wormy piece of mystery wood.

Gary Mrozek shared 2 small lidded boxes and a bottle stopper made from red elm burl. He also had a large urn he made from the burl for his sister's in-laws.

John Menning shared a cutting board that he and his 10 year old grandson made. John did the sawing but his grandson did all the planning and assembly.

Ellen Starr gave a demo on carving using a flexible shaft tool. Ellen uses a Master Carver Micro Pro. African Mahogany is her favorite wood to carve. While carving Ellen usually wears a respirator to protect her lungs from all the fine dust. She buys her bits from MDI, Amazon and Reo Grand, a jewelry supply site. Her favorite bits are stump cutters which is not a brand but a type of bit. While carving she uses her thumb to steady her hand as she carves. She usually holds the piece she is carving against her body to keep it steady and close to her "old eyes". This also helps keep the piece steady as she carves against or with the grain so there is less jumping or bumping around. Most of her finishing and sanding is done by hand with some dremel type attachments also used. By making gentle shallow slow cuts much sanding can be avoided.
