We had a great turn out for the March 11th meeting. Our count was 41 members, the most we've had in a long time.



Fred started the meeting at 10:00. He commented on the large number of people (41) in attendance. The new members present today were Mellissa Chance and her husband and John Derring. They had both taken turning classes through the <u>Paramount Center for the Arts</u> (PCA) so they got a free membership in the MMAW for the rest of the calendar year with their registration.

Fred stated that the woodcarver and woodworker clubs are using the new AV equipment. We are working on working out some of the technical issues with the recording, patience please. Also, next week the start of installation of an overhead camera will begin.

MMAW is looking for volunteers to help with several on-going activities. As part of your membership in the MMAW you are asked to volunteer some time for the club besides your membership fee. We are looking for help with the AV setup and running it, greeters to welcome new members at the meetings, clean up after meetings, new officers (president, secretary, treasurer and one board member are needed for next year (we would like an **Election Committee** to look for these new club officers) and more as they arise.
